The Fort Gratiot Light Station's 5 acres include the Lighthouse (1829), Light Keeper's Duplex (1874), Fog Signal Building (1900), Single Keeper's Dwelling (1932), former Coast Guard Station (1932), and Equipment Building (1939).

The Port Huron Museum offers tours of the Lighthouse, Fog Signal Building and Light Keeper's Duplex. Tours are available May through December.

Parks and Recreation Commission and Port Huron Museum, the Friends have


done major restorations on the Lighthouse, Equipment Building, Fog Signal Building and Duplex Building, but there is much more to be done.

Adopt-a-Step at the Fort Gratiot Light

The Fort Gratiot Light has been standing guard on the shores of Lake Huron since 1829, making it the oldest lighthouse in Michigan. It is being preserved for future generations by a partnership of the St. Clair County Parks and Recreation Commission, volunteers from the Friends of the Fort Gratiot Light, staff and volunteers from the Port Huron Museum — and you.

By adopting a step, your contribution will support the ongoing efforts to restore, preserve and promote this important part of Great Lakes history.


The historic Lighthouse stands 82 feet tall. Generations of light keepers and visitors during nearly two centuries have climbed its 94 winding steps, which open up on a small open-air observation deck around the light.

By adopting a step, your contribution will be recognized on a plaque with your name and brief message that will be placed on a board inside the Lighthouse for all visitors to see.



Our donation scale:

- The first 10 spiraling stair steps: \$1,000 per step.
- The middle 74 spiraling stair steps: \$500 per step.
- The last 10 spiraling stair steps: \$1,000 per step.
- The Ladder to the Light (the final 10 steps the Light keeper used to maintain the light): \$10,000.



The spiraling stairs inside the Fort Gratiot Lighthouse are original to the structure, which was erected in 1829. Visitors walk up 94 steps to reach the observation deck at the top of the 82-foot-tall Lighthouse.



Join the Adopt-a-Step preservation program

Your recognition plaque will be displayed prominently in the Lighthouse. It is limited to 3 lines, with a maximum of 21 characters (including spaces) per line.
